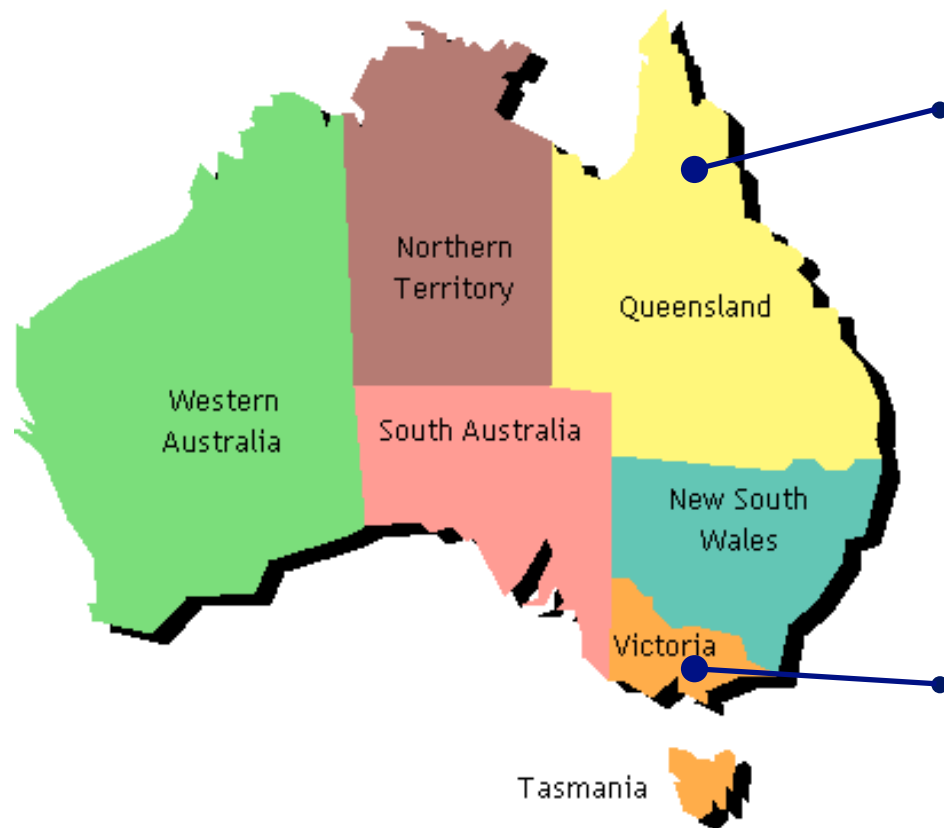

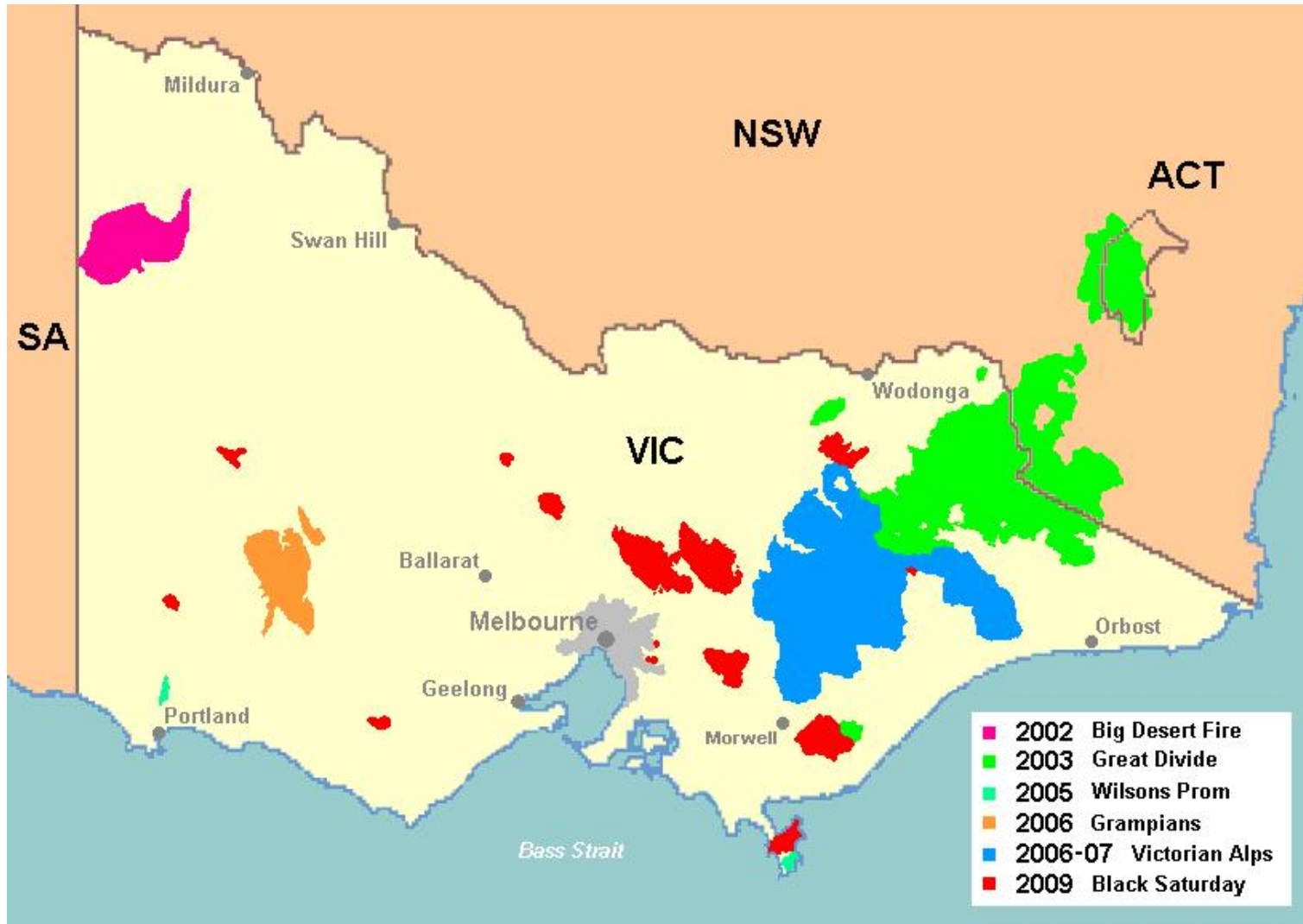


Tropical Cyclone Larry

Prevention

Prevention (or mitigation) seeks to eliminate or reduce the impact of hazards themselves and/or to reduce the susceptibility and increase the resilience of the community subject to the impact of those hazards;



Preparedness

Preparedness establishes arrangements and plans and provide education and information to prepare the community to deal effectively with such emergencies and disasters as may eventuate;

Response

Response activates preparedness arrangements and plans to put in place effective measures to deal with emergencies and disasters if and when they do occur



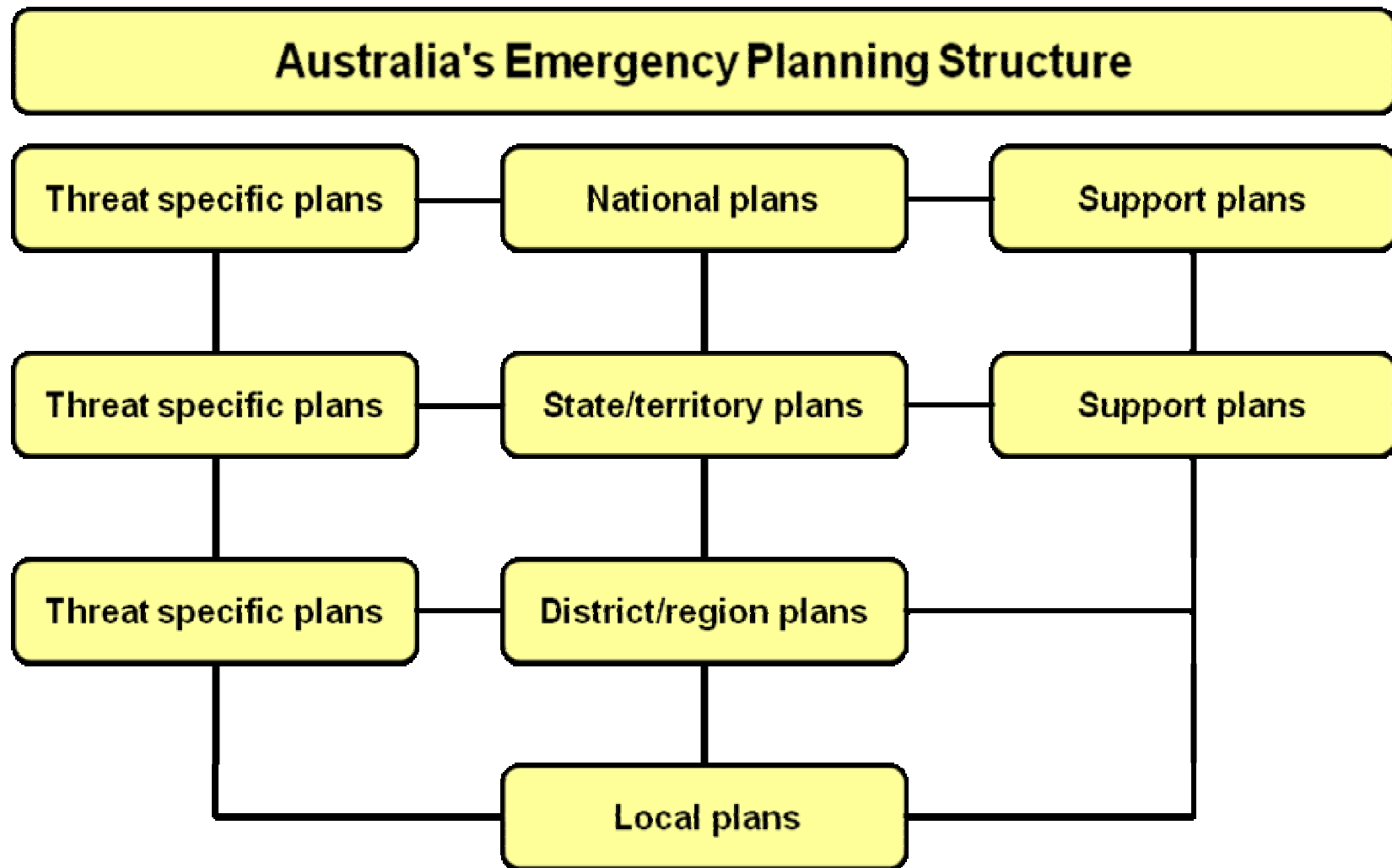
Recovery

Recover activities assist a community affected by an emergency or disaster in reconstruction of the physical infrastructure and restoration of emotional, social, economic and physical well-being

Note: recovery should start as soon as possible.

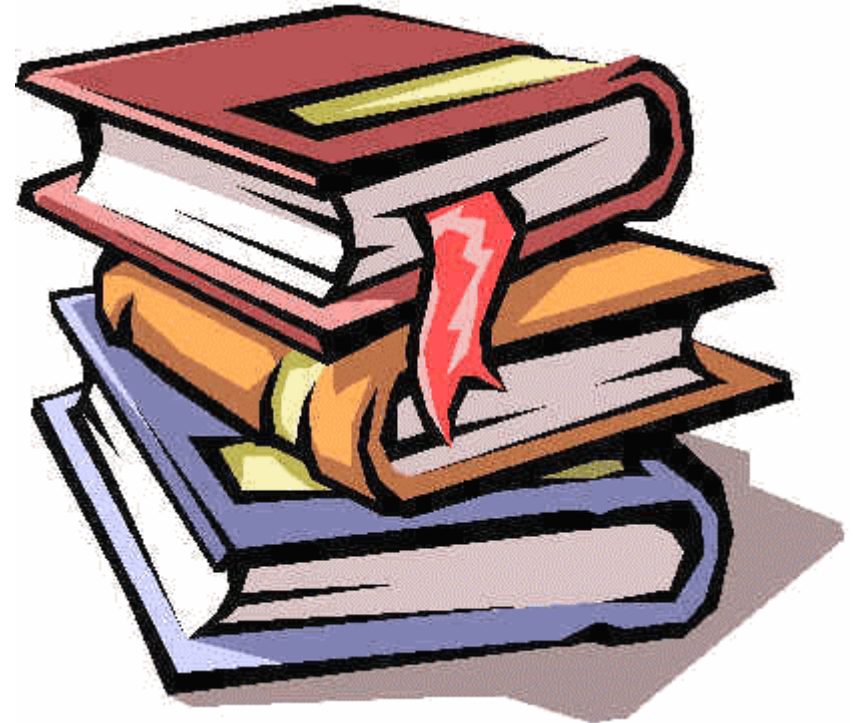

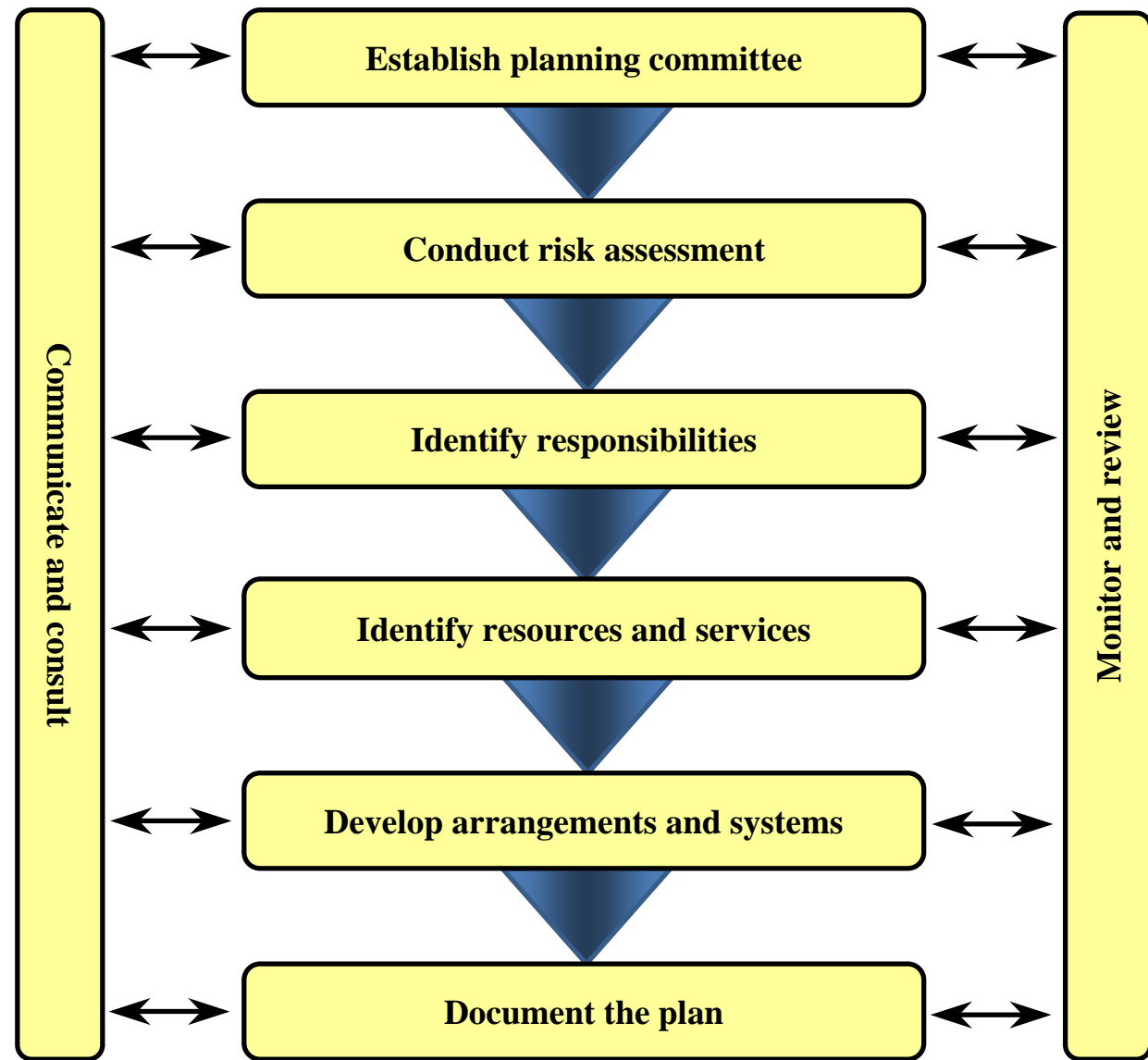
