# Welfare assessment protocol for shelter dogs

## Introduction

Stray dog populations pose serious public health concerns. To tackle this issue, targeted strategies are needed. A crucial topic strictly correlated to stray dog population management, concerns shelter facilities. No-kill policies lead to the proliferation of long-term shelters for stray dogs in many European countries. Gaps in the management systems and an imbalance between high numbers of dogs entering the shelter and low adoption rates, result in high percentages of animals that are likely to spend most part or all their lives in a confined condition. In this scenario, animal welfare becomes a critical issue. Welfare Quality® projects were successfully designed and applied to livestock animals. The possibility of applying similar systems also to canine shelter populations could be a fundamental step to ensure high quality standards of life to these animals.

This training activity is part of a wider project whose aim is to develop a useful and reliable tool to accurately assess the welfare of dogs housed in rescue shelters. The main objective is to identify and validate animal-based measures in an attempt to estimate the actual welfare state of the animals in terms of their behaviour, health or physical condition. Since welfare is a condition of the animal, animal based measures are likely to be the most direct reflection of their welfare state.

# **Learning objectives**

The main aim of the project is to develop a protocol for the assessment of shelter dogs welfare. This protocol was drafted and now needs to be tested by different assessors working in different Countries in order to finally achieve a feasible, valid and useful new tool.

In order to standardise the assessments and achieve a high repeatability between assessors, it's first of all necessary to train the assessors that will participate in this activity from different country.

At the end of the training course, beneficiaries will be able to:

apply the protocol for assessing welfare of sheltered dogs.
